Sixty-five to 75 million year old fossil sites containing dinosaur and other fossils have recently been discovered in the beautiful and rugged badlands near Marmarth, North Dakota. The North Dakota Geological Survey and the Marmarth Research Foundation, in cooperation with the U.S. Forest Service - Dakota Prairie Grasslands, will co-sponsor scientific, professionally-conducted, fossil excavations at these sites in June/July 2008.
